

2025 LEGISLATIVE PRIORITIES

The Bay County Chamber of Commerce Supports:

Business and Economic Development

Elimination of business rent tax. Eliminating this tax can stimulate economic growth, promote entrepreneurship, reduce administrative complexities, and foster a fairer tax system, creating a business climate that attracts the nation's top job creators.	S
Recognizes the importance of <i>protecting Florida's Home Rule</i> and opposes efforts to remove or reduce this authority.	S

Quality of Life

Full funding of the Sadowski State and Local Government Housing Trust Funds which are essential to affordable housing. In addition, the Chamber encourages the preservation of SB 2512 which permanently stops any further sweeping of funds and supports augmenting affordable housing funding with supplemental revenue in the future. Workforce Development and Education

Fostering strong partnerships between the business community and our public schools is LIS crucial for the long-term success of our community. This includes, but is not limited to support for school-based mentoring, encouraging participation in the Partnership Bay program, and opportunities to align education and workforce development with employer needs. S The efforts of Florida State University Panama City to continue development and expansion of programs at FSUPC to meet the needs of the community and local workforce needs. Furthermore, the Chamber supports enhanced funding for the FAMU-FSU College of Engineering that would meet the engineering workforce needs in northwest Florida. Continued funding for PIPELINE and LINE Funds to meet program needs at Gulf Coast State S

College in order to support future local workforce demand for nurses and other medical professions.

S Expand access to affordable childcare by adjusting income eligibility thresholds for assistance programs to promote early childhood development and support working families.

Military & Defense

Key projects for Naval Support Activity Center Panama City:

- Dive School Pier Repairs. Repairs needed for the structural deficiencies of dock, concrete pavement, utility trenches, and fender system.
- Barracks Replacement. Existing barracks capacity limitation requires 3 beds in 2 person-designed rooms with an approved DoN waiver request. Future need projections estimate a shortage of 100+ beds.
- Turning Basin. Funding to create a strategically located turning basin near the entrance to the installation's berthing facility to accommodate future mission needs and increase mission efficiency.
- Child Development Center. Funding for a new installation child care facility to replace pre-fabricated, temporary structures and address the severe shortage of childcare options for all eligible families.

Opposing any action expanding offshore drilling or Wind Energy Areas in the Gulf of Mexico F within or east of the Military Mission Line and requests a legislative solution to extending the moratorium or implementing an indefinite ban on all offshore energy development when the current extension sunsets in 2032.

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Transportation and Infrastructure

Northwest Florida International Beaches Airport Capital Projects:

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- The creation of an aerospace and aviation hub at the Northwest Florida Beaches International Airport (ECP), known as the ECP Aviation Center of Excellence.
- ECP terminal improvements and expansion to support future growth and capacity.
- Further development of General Aviation Areas at the Airport.

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Transportation Priorities:

- East Avenue and SR 389 (East Avenue) improved 2 lanes from Port (East Terminal) Entrance to Sherman Avenue
- Extend Philip Griffitts Sr. Parkway Extension from Nautilus Street to Chip Seal Parkway (Sports Complex)
- SR 22 (Wewa Highway), widen to 4 lanes from SR 30A (US 98) Tyndall Pkwy to Star Avenue
- Star Avenue, widen to 4 lanes from SR 22 (Wewa Highway) to US 231 (SR 75)

Gulf, Bay and Fisheries

SIF Efforts to definitively determine the feasibility of permanently reopening East Pass and allocation of state and federal funds toward the permanent solution should studies deem its reopening feasible.

Recognizing that bay systems are an essential component of the Florida Panhandle's LIS economic viability and quality of life and supports Florida legislative funding for Panhandle Estuary Programs, including the St. Andrew and St. Joseph Bays Estuary Program.

Gulf of Mexico economic and environmental restoration projects funded by the Resources LIS and Ecosystems Sustainability, Tourist Opportunities, and Revived Economies of the Gulf Coast States Act of 2012 (RESTORE Act), Natural Resource Damage Assessment (NRDA) funds and Gulf Environmental Benefit Fund following Deepwater Horizon disaster.
